Virginia Parole Board

The goal of the Parole Board is to release on parole, those eligible offenders deemed suitable for release and whose release will be compatible with the welfare of society and the offender.

What the Courts Think

- <u>Swarthout v. Cooke</u>, 562 U.S. 216, 131 S.Ct. 859 (2011)
 - No constitutional right to be conditionally released before expiration of sentence
 - Minimal due process required in parole process
- Burnette v. Fahey, 687 F.3d 171 (2012)
 - Parole Board has broad discretion
 - In developing policies and procedures
 - In deciding its cases

Definitions

Parole Eligible (PE)

• Committed crimes prior to January 1, 1995

Truth-in-Sentencing (TIS)

• Committed crimes after January 1, 1995

Discretionary Parole

Offenders eligible for parole consideration:

- For the first time
- For the second time
- For the third time
- For fourth or subsequent time
- Life

unless Capital Murder of Child less than 8

– Life x 2 or more

unless Capital Murder

1/3 or 12 years 1/3 or 13 years 1/2 or 14 years 3/4 or 15 years 15 years 25 years 20 years 30 years

Parole Ineligibility

- Offenders not eligible for parole consideration if convicted of:
- 3 SEPARATE OFFENSES OF
 - Murder
 - Rape or/and
 - Robbery by presenting of firearm or other deadly weapon
 - Where not part of a common act, transaction or scheme
 - Or

Parole Ineligibility

- 3 separate felony offenses of manufacturing, selling, giving or distributing or possessing with intent to manufacture, sell, give or distribute a controlled substance.
 - Where not part of common act, transaction or scheme and
 - Who has been at liberty between each conviction
 - Of the 287 "3X Losers" only four are ineligible due to drug distribution convictions.

Percentage of PE/TIS population Serving Life Sentences

- Among the 4,348 PE offenders confined on April 30, 2015, 1,200 (28%) were serving one or more life sentence.
- Among the 33,336 TIS offenders confined on April 30, 2015, 1,024 (3%) were serving one or more life sentence.

Number of PE/TIS Offenders Serving Higher Sentences (Excluding Life)

Among the 3,148 **PE** offenders not serving a life sentence confined on April 30, 2015:

- 1,169 (37%) were serving a sentence of at least 25 years but fewer than 50 years
- 932 (30%) were serving a sentence of at least 50 years but fewer than 100 years
- 191 (6%) were serving a sentence of at least 100 years

Among the 32,312 **TIS** offenders not serving a life sentence confined on April 30, 2015:

- 3,004 (9%) were serving a sentence of at least 25 years but fewer than 50 years
- 746 (2%) were serving a sentence of at least 50 years but fewer than 100 years
- 117 (<1%) were serving a sentence of at least 100 years



Statistics on Crimes Committed by Geriatric Offenders

State Responsible Offenders Age 60+ FY2000-FY2015*

- SR Confined Offenders Age 60+ have more than tripled since FY2000 (from 460 to 1,929)
- SR New Court Commitments Age 60+ have more than tripled since FY2000 (from 74 to 263)
- Over 2% of the SR NCC and over 5% of the SR Confined Population are Age 60+

Geriatric Release Eligibility of SR Confined Population As of June 30, 2015

- 3% of the SR Confined Population is currently eligible for Geriatric Release consideration
- Almost three-quarters (74%) of the SR Confined Population is expected to be released prior to becoming eligible for Geriatric Release consideration


FY2015 SR Confined Population Age at Sentencing by Age Groups

- Under 50 group: 85% sentenced between 18-39 (54% sentenced by age 29)
- 50-59 group: 68% sentenced between 40-59 (58% sentenced age 45+)
- 60-64 group: 56% sentenced age 50+ (23% sentenced 60+)
- 65+ group: 64%
 sentenced age 50+ (47%
 sentenced age 60+)

FY2015 SR Confined Population Prior SR Incarcerations by Age Group

- 77% of the 65+ group are serving their first SR incarceration
- 64% of the 60-64 group are serving their first SR incarceration
- 49% of the 50-59 group are serving their first SR incarceration
- 61% of the Under 50 group are serving their first SR incarceration



Offenders Considered for Geriatric Release By Most Serious Offense CY2006 - CY2014



FY2015 SR Confined Population Most Serious Offense* by Age Groups

- 80% of the age 65+ inmates and 72% of inmates in the 60-64 age group are incarcerated for a violent crime; this compares to only 58% of the younger inmates
- The most common offense for older inmates:
 - Rape/Sexual Assault
 - 20% of the 60-64 age group
 - 31% of the 65+ age group
 - Murder
 - 22% of the 60-64 age group
 - 26% of the 65+ age group



*Most Serious Offense (MSO) for an offender for his current term of SR incarceration; based on SAF Unit offense hierarchy used for forecast purposes; MSO differs from Violent by §17.1-805: 1) Violent by §17.1-805 looks at an offender's entire criminal history while MSO only looks at the offenses for an offender's current term of SR incarceration; and 2) Violent by §17.1-805 considers most burglary offenses to be Violent while MSO counts burglaries as a Property offense SOURCE: VADOC Statistical Analysis & Forecast Unit, July 16, 2015
